From the Rabbi's Study.....

FALLING THROUGH THE CRACKS

We all know the expression. We try our hardest and make our best efforts, but in spite of it all, some things just “fall through the cracks”.

It happens in our shuls as well. It may be a guest, a parent visiting from Israel, a new family, or even a quiet member who is overlooked. No one says hello, and he or she falls through the cracks.

When it occurs, there is intense pain. What can be more hurtful than isolation? The worse form of incarceration is solitary confinement. People who are not greeted are deeply wounded. As a Rabbi, I have received more calls about this issue than almost any other area of concern. Our shuls are generally friendly, and members are warm individuals. But once in a while, someone is left out, and they end up falling through the cracks.

I know why it happens. We all rely on the “other fellow” to welcome the guests. That’s a big problem, because when everyone relies on someone else, no one is left to say, “hello”. If we would all resolve to be the “other fellow”, people would stop falling through the cracks.

Here is what we must do. When someone new arrives, each one of us must take responsibility to welcome this person. “How are you? What is your name? I am so and so. Can I help you? It’s nice to meet you. Enjoy your stay...” After all, we don’t want even a single person to fall through the cracks.

And when we say “good shabbos” after davening, don’t shake hands with you friend nearby. They will be okay even if they don’t receive your blessing. Look for the person who you never spoke to before, even though you’ve been in shul together for twenty years. Your “good Shabbos” will be more meaningful, because it may save someone from falling through the cracks.

Pesach is a great time to think about this problem. The Halacha requires that bedikas chometz (the search for chometz) extend to chorin visadakin – the cracks and crevices, because you never know what small particles of chometz may have fallen through the cracks.

There is a powerful symbolism contained here-in. Chometz represents the good intentions that run afoul, the great plans that have spoiled and turned sour. That’s why we must search the chorin visadakin, to make certain our positive aspirations have not fallen through the cracks.

Now here is the essence of it all. Crumbs have no feeling, while human beings have frail hearts and tender souls, and are easily offended. We spend weeks preparing our homes for Pesach, scouring and cleaning in a frenzy, searching for the insidious chometz, just to make sure that not one single crumb has managed to slip by. If only we made the same super-effort to insure that every human being is greeted properly and given the respect that a tzellem elokim (one created in the image of G-d) so richly deserves. What a difference that would make. This year, as we search with our candle through the nooks and crannies of our homes, let’s do some soul searching as well, and resolve to no longer allow anyone to fall through the cracks.

President's Message

Passover teaches us many lessons. One that is often overlooked is the effect of one individual on the larger community.

Most of us picture Moses leading the Israelites through the desert, but we rarely take the time to think about Moses when he started on the path that would eventually take his people out of Egypt. When Moses encountered the burning bush, he was all alone, fleeing from the consequences of an act he committed that only one other person knew about. Initially reluctant to undertake his mission, eventually he changed not only his life and the life of his family, but also the lives of the entire Jewish people.

Of course, it would have been easier for Moses to live out his life in the royal comfort and splendor of the Pharaoh's palace, but instead he chose a different path. Rather than being attended by slaves, he led a nation of slaves through obstacles that often seemed insurmountable.

"I'm just one person. What can I do?" It's the way we all feel sometimes. And it's easy to tell ourselves that if something is a big enough problem, someone else will address it. Yet sometimes looking at a situation with determination to do something about it allows us to make things change.

Most people don't realize that there already is a Palestinian Arab state. In fact, it covers 78% of the Palestine Mandate. It is called Jordan. Knowing that one simple fact can't help but change somebody's perception of the Arab-Israeli conflict. After all, it's hard for the Arabs to complain that the existence of Israel is unfair when they got 4/5 of Palestine and the Jews were only given 1/5. Yet most people don't think about that. Several years ago, before Menachem Begin met Jimmy Carter and Anwar Sadat at Camp David, my father, David Salwen, was attending the annual AIPAC conference in Washington DC. He had occasion to meet one of Prime Minister Begin's deputies and was discussing the issue of Hasbara, getting Israel's story out to the public. He commented that Israelis should never refer to a "Palestinian state", but should always refer to a "SECOND Palestinian state". The first person he spoke to brought over a second and then a third person. One of the Israelis remarked that "everyone knows this already and nobody seems to care". Another complained "you can't reduce such a complicated problem to a series of slogans". My father disagreed, pointing out that the Arabs have had great success doing exactly that for many years. He repeated his belief that most people don't know this, certainly most Americans don't know this, and he suggested that when the Prime Minister met with President Carter, he should use the phrase "second Palestinian Arab state" as often as possible.

Weeks later, when inside reports of what went on at Camp David began to leak out, one interesting story concerned President Carter trying to exert pressure on Prime Minister Begin to tie a possible deal with Egypt to a deal with Yasser Arafat. Begin asked "why should I be the Israeli Prime Minister who allows the creation of a second Palestinian Arab state?" Carter was taken aback. He asked Begin what he meant and Begin explained the history. Carter turned to Zbigniew Brzezinski and asked "is this true?" Brzezinski had to acknowledge that it was. Carter's offensive was blunted and the treaty between Israel and Egypt became a reality.

At a time when our Hebrew School had shrunk to the point where it was struggling to maintain its effectiveness as an Jewish educational institution, our President, Herb Friend, came across the startling statistic that 54% of Jewish families in Nassau and Suffolk counties were not affiliated with a synagogue. Analysts wondered whether the children of these families, lacking any Jewish education or connection to the larger Jewish community, would become a "lost generation", alienated from their Jewish identity. He came up with an idea that he felt would help these families, help the larger Jewish community and help our Hebrew School. Why not offer a tuition-free Jewish education to anyone who wanted it? He soon found out why not. "Other Temples will object. They'll feel we're stealing potential members from them!" "What if people decide to leave shuls that charge tuition to come to our free Hebrew School? Do we want to be known for "poaching" other Temples' members?" "How will we make up for the loss of the tuition money we get from our current students?" Fortunately, Herb was not deterred by the nay-sayers. He made his case to the Board of Trustees and to the Congregation and we went ahead and implemented this revolutionary idea.

A couple of months later, I got a call from the President of Temple Hillel in Woodmere, whom I had met at a meeting. It turned out that word of our bold experiment had spread far and wide. A friend of hers in Northern California(!) had called to ask if she had a contact at Temple B'nai Sholom in Rockville Centre. They were faced with a similar enrollment situation in their school and they wanted to find out about our tuition-free Hebrew School.

When Irwin Ralph was visiting friends in Florida, he found out about a series of satellite TV broadcasts from New York's 92nd Street Y. It was an impressive lineup of speakers on a wide variety of subjects. When he returned home, he

looked into it and discovered that the program was available to institutions nationwide. The Y was limiting enrollment in the program geographically, but fortunately the South Shore of Long Island was still available. He mentioned the idea to a number of people at B'nai Sholom and everybody thought it was great. He brought it to the Board of Trustees, who also loved the idea. The problem was that the equipment required a substantial financial investment and the Temple didn't have the money.

Recognizing the possibility that some other organization might grab the "exclusive" on Long Island's South Shore, Irwin realized he couldn't wait until money became available.. He arranged for the Rocklyn Lodge of B'nai Brith to underwrite the cost of the equipment and its installation. In return, we instituted a special discount program for members of Rockville Centre's two synagogues, so the entire Jewish community of Rockville Centre would benefit from Rocklyn Lodge's generosity. Thanks to Irwin's vision and determination, people all over the country see and hear our name and our community at the beginning and end of each satellite broadcast. We recently dedicated our ongoing "Live from the 92nd Street Y" program series in his memory.

The Haggadah tells us that Moses didn't just free the enslaved Jews of his generation, he freed us, too. If he hadn't acted when he did, future generations of Jews would have lived as slaves in Egypt. It's important to realize that the effects of our day-to-day actions often go beyond the obvious.

It's also important to remember that our individual efforts can have far-reaching effects. While the discussions at Camp David don't seem to have had an effect on Carter and Brzezinski's attitude toward Israel, the Egyptian-Israeli peace treaty became a reality. Our Hebrew School enrollment has more than quadrupled and over the years dozens, if not hundreds, of children have received a Jewish education and had their whole family's Jewish identity strengthened through our program. Who knows how many more communities have followed our lead, multiplying the effect, possibly affecting thousands of Jewish lives? Hundreds have been entertained and informed by personalities ranging from Alan Dershowitz to Jerry Seinfeld. They have come not only from Rockville Centre, but from surrounding communities, some surprisingly far away.

So as we enjoy our Matzah Brei this year, let's all think about what we as individuals can do to help make Congregation B'nai Sholom-Beth David an even better place. If we put our minds to it, there's no telling what might happen!

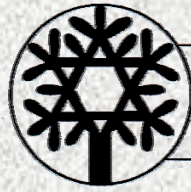
